WHAT IS A COMMUNITY DRIVE AROUND?

The Board regularly drives around the community on a bi-monthly basis. The reason? We survey the community to see if there are any residents in violation of the covenants, the resident will be notified, and given the opportunity to address/discuss the concern. We also keep an extra eye out on homes that might be vacant and homes we know owners have gone for the winter. It is important we have a safe and attractive community; doing the drive arounds is one way the Board can achieve that.

CAN A RESIDENT HAVE THEIR OWN YARD SALE?

Absolutely! Sometimes you are not ready when our Spring and Fall Community Yard Sales occur, so you can always have a yard sale on your own property. And you can put out signs as long as you take them down after the sale.

YARDWASTE...THE ONGOING CHALLENGE

Sandy Brae <u>does not</u> have yard waste pick-up and almost all the commercial trash removal companies don't do it anymore. Please do not mix your yard waste in with your trash; if the trash truck sees that, they will not pick-up your can. ALSO, please do not dump it behind the pumping station in the third section. The HOA pays a lot of money every year to clean it out.

DOGS OFF LEASH

Over the summer, there have been incidents of dogs roaming off leash and unattended. Please do not just let your dog or cat out the door to roam free; it is not safe for the animal or your neighbors. When walking your dog, be courteous and pick-up after them.

2023 ANNUAL DUES

At the October 2022 Board Meeting, the Board voted not to increase dues for 2023. The dues will remain at \$125 annually. Your invoice will go out over Thanksgiving week and is due, according to the Covenants, by January 1. The cost to operate the HOA goes up every year...snow plowing, common area mowing, attorney fees, postage, etc. and since the implementation of a Transfer Fee was defeated, our dues is the only consistent revenue source.

SNOW PLOWING

Reminder that the HOA pays to have the streets plowed and entrances salted because we are on Level 4 Plowing with the State, and we need our community cleared before that Level happens. This does not include driveways or sidewalks, so please make your arrangements NOW for that. Our private plow company will not stop to plow your driveway.

UPDATE ON OUR ROAD PROJECT PHASE 2

Well, this effort is not going as smoothly as our Phase 1 Project did. It has been riddled with cancellations and half starts. Although we are working closely with DelDot and they are acutely aware of our frustrations, the company that won the bid is out of New Jersey plus the fog seal application is affected by wet weather or heat over 89 degrees. This process is painfully slow, however DelDot promises completion before winter.

UPDATE ON THE COVENAT CHANGE'S PART 1 AND PART 2

Regretfully, both Part 1 and Part 2 recommendations from the Board did not pass. There was not 131 yes votes for any recommendation for it to pass. The good news is that the Board did receive 133 total ballots for Part 2 and the vast majority were votes for change, but the problem was not enough residents voted.

CAR COUNTER CABLES ON POSTAL LANE

Did you notice the two cables across Postal Lane by the trash hauling property? Seems DelDot is counting cars on Postal to plan for the new road that is dumping out on Postal or is it for a new community of townhomes to be built on the land adjacent to the golf course or have the Warrington's resurrected the RV-Boat Stage Facility? The Board will let you know when we know. What we know for sure right now is that the Warrington's have finally, after 1.5 years, re-submitted a site plan in compliance with P&Z's conditional use request and the counting cars is part of the plan. Stay tuned!!

Smart Spending in the Holiday Season

The holiday season is fast approaching, a fact alone that may already have alarm bells ringing in your head. If you have a tighter budget but still want to show your friends and family how much you care, Sean Pyles of NerdWallet suggests shying away from that mindset. Instead, be creative and leverage your skills. If you're renowned for being crafty in the kitchen, hand out certificates good for a fancy meal of the holder's choice or, as U.S. News & World Report's Karen Cordaway recommends, bake a smorgasbord of sweets to give out. If you have friends who have a newborn, you can gift them with a day of peace and quiet by creating a voucher for anytime babysitting. Experiences matter, and they're easier to customize to a particular person's needs or interests. What's more, they may not cost you as much in the run up to the holidays.

You may already feel yourself sweating the impending holiday season, but there's no reason to. Though you may feel pressured to give expensive gifts and go into debt out of generosity, you can spend smart and mitigate any financial damage the season of giving might cause.
